

**MINUTES OF REGULAR MEETING
SAUK VALLEY COLLEGE BOARD**

October 25, 1965

President Tabor called the regular October meeting of the Sauk Valley College Board to order in the Morrison Community High School, October 25, 1965, 7:30 P.M.

The secretary called the roll and the following were present: Peter W. Dillon, Catherine R. Perkins, Kenneth L. Reuter, Clayton R. Schuneman, Gerald S. Stuff, Warren E. Walder, and Forrest L. Tabor. None were absent.

Mr. Walder moved to approve minutes of previous meetings as submitted and corrected. Mr. Dillon seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Mr. Stuff moved to approve the attached treasurer's report. Mr. Dillon seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Mr. Schuneman moved to approve the attached monthly statement of budgetary items. Mr. Reuter seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Mr. Schuneman moved to approve bills for payment as listed and attached in the amount of \$1,177.11. The roll was called and the following members voted "Aye": Peter W. Dillon, Catherine R. Perkins, Kenneth L. Reuter, Clayton R. Schuneman, Gerald S. Stuff, Warren E. Walder, and Forrest L. Tabor. None voted "Nay." The motion carried.

Mr. Tabor reported the receipt of an anonymous gift of \$2500, to be added to the College Foundation Fund and used for a trip to California for the purpose of examining local facilities and foundations at other colleges.

Mr. Reuter moved to accept the gift and that president Tabor be authorized to represent the Board in making travel arrangements. Mr. Walder seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Mr. Castandyck reviewed for the press the purpose and formation of the College Foundation.

Mr. Schuneman moved the nomination of Mr. Stuff and Mrs. Perkins to be the College Board representatives on the board of the College Foundation. Mr. Reuter seconded the motion. The motion carried. Mr. Stuff and Mrs. Perkins were declared the nominees.

Mr. Reuter moved the appointment of a special committee to work with four trustees: one from the high school, three from the College Board, and for each assigned area, one from outside trustees. Mr. Dillon seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Mr. Walder suggested each Board member report any available space that could be used as temporary quarters for the College until a permanent location is found. The Board

discussed purchasing portable buildings to alleviate this problem. Mr. Walder's committee was also to look into the possibility of temporary buildings that can be disposed of at small cost.

The planting of trees that might be made available to the College was discussed in the light of the need for a campus horticulturist.

The need for leadership, experience in junior college, fringe benefits to be provided, retirement plans, annuities, insurance, etc. were discussed as they relate to choosing a president.

The secretary was requested to write to Triton College for copies of their fringe benefits program.

The secretary was also asked to express to the C. K. Willett Engineering Company the Board's appreciation for their prompt and efficient service they had rendered in preparing a detailed survey of the building site on such short notice.

Mr. Castendyck met with the State Highway Engineer to discuss the road and access to the building site and with the township road commissioner regarding maintenance of the road. Both of these are to be shown in the original bid specifications.

Mr. Castendyck reported the second option with Mr. Schuler covering the farm house and adjacent site for five-seven years with state assistance was to expire this year and that the Board was asked to act with the view of making a decision on the use of the land for temporary quarters.

Mr. Hinueber reported that Master Michael Flanigan, Dixon, Illinois, had been declared the winner of the prize contest for naming the College and will receive the \$25.00 prize, plaque, and free tuition for one semester.

Mr. Walder moved to adjourn to November 8, 1965. Mr. Schuneman seconded the motion. The roll was called and the following voted "Aye": Peter W. Dillon, Catherine R. Perkins, Kenneth L. Reuter, Clayton R. Schuneman, Gerald S. Stuff, Warren E. Walder, and Forrest L. Tabor. None voted "Nay." The motion carried and the meeting adjourned.
