**MINUTES OF REGULAR MEETING
SAUK VALLEY COLLEGE BOARD
February 28, 1966**

President Sabol called the regular February meeting of the Board of Sauk Valley College to order in the Rock Falls High School, Rock Falls, Illinois, on Monday, February 28, 1966, 7:30 P.M.

The secretary called the roll and listed the following members present: Ray A. Dillon, Catherine R. Perkins, Kenneth L. Reuter, Clayton E. Schuneman, Gerald A. Stuff, Warren E. Walder, and Forrest L. Tabor. None were absent.

Also present was Dr. Edward J. Sabol, Attorney Robert W. Castendyck, Superintendent Stanley Weber of the Dixon Schools and Ira Halston of Odell MacConnell Associates.

Mr. Schuneman moved to approve minutes as submitted. Mr. Reuter seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Mr. Walder moved to approve the treasurer's report and the monthly statement of budgetary items as attached. Mr. Dillon seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Mr. Walder also moved to allow for payment of the payroll journal and the attached list of current bills. Mr. Dillon seconded the motion. The secretary called the roll and the following voted "Aye": Peter W. Dillon, Catherine R. Perkins, Kenneth L. Reuter, Clayton R. Schuneman, Gerald S. Stuff, Warren E. Walder, and Forrest L. Tabor. The motion carried. None voted "Nay". The motion carried.

The Board proceeded to canvass the results of the bond referendum called on February 26, 1966.. Mr. Walder moved and Mr. Reuter seconded the adoption of the resolution as read and attached declaring the passing of the referendum by the voters in the district, allowing the Board to issue bonds in the amount of \$3,975,000 for building and equipping buildings and purchase of a site for Sauk Valley College. The secretary called the roll and the following voted "Aye": Peter W. Dillon, Catherine R. Perkins, Kenneth L. Reuter, Clayton R. Schuneman, Gerald S. Stuff, Warren E. Walder and Forrest L. Tabor. None voted "Nay". The motion carried and the resolution was declared adopted.

Mr. Dillon moved to adopt a resolution ceasing control of Sauk Valley College as a Class II district in compliance with the said directive from the Illinois Junior College Board. Mr. Reuter seconded the motion. The secretary called the roll and the following voted "Aye": Peter W. Dillon, Catherine R. Perkins, Kenneth L. Reuter, Clayton R. Schuneman, Gerald R. Stuff, Warren E. Walder, and Forrest L. Tabor. None voted "Nay". The motion carried and the resolution was declared adopted.

The Board immediately reconvened as a Class I district in compliance with the said directive.

Mr. Castendyck reported that Mr. Burroughs of Chapman and Cutler had expressed an opinion that it would be well to consider retaining professional assistance in the sale of bonds of our magnitude in order to assure competitive bidding in a national market as well as having experienced aid in achieving initially the proper bond rating.

Mr. Goss of Paul D. Spear Associates outlined for the Board their proposal for preparing the needed information and prospectus for the bond rating and procedures for sale of the bonds. He indicated their fee for this service would be \$4700.

The Board also heard the proposal of Mr. Voss of Municipal Research Associates indicating their fee for this service would be \$1900 plus printing of the Prospectus, printing of the bonds and travel expense to New York for the rating hearing. Both consultants indicated that bonds are presently at the highest rate in the past eleven years.

President Tabor reported that one minor revisions in space allotments had been made in the application for the Federal Grant, which would not alter the amount of the grant. He also reported that priority points as established by the Illinois Board of Higher Education had been forwarded.

Mr. Tabor reported that the architects had requested additional borings to the site where footings would be located. They will be performed by the C. K. Willett Company, who are proceeding with the test borings.

Dr. Sabol reported that of the 290 returns of inquiries to area high school seniors, 126 had previously made other plans.

Mr. Walder moved and Mr. Dillon seconded the motion that Municipal Research Associates, Kenilworth, Illinois, be retained to assist with the necessary information and bond sales if personal and business references are satisfactory to Dr. Sabol, Mr. Tabor and Attorney Castendyck. The secretary called the roll and the following voted "Aye": Peter W. Dillon, Catherine R. Perkins, Kenneth L. Reuter, Clayton R. Schuneman, Gerald S. Stuff, Warren E. Walder and Forrest L. Tabor. None voted "Nay". The motion carried.

Mr. Schuneman moved and Mr. Walder seconded the motion to instruct the Secretary to convey by appropriate letters to all the news media in the area the thanks and appreciation of the Board for their support and promotion of our recent bond referendum. The motion carried.

The Board's attention was called to the announcement of a rezoning petition hearing that is to be held at the Dixon Court House March 23 and 24, sought by Goldie C. Schuler et others for the purpose of classifying agricultural land, that adjoins the Sauk Valley College site, to a service classification to permit erection of a motel, service station and eating establishment.

Mr. Dillon and Mr. Reuter reported that Milledgeville, Ohio and parts of Franklin Center are progressing toward an early annexation to Sauk Valley College District.

The Board agreed to accept the invitation of the Walnut Community High School to hold their March meeting in Walnut.

The following actions were recorded:

1. Mr. Walder resigned as chairman of the committee for the temporary facilities.
2. The Board requested Dr. Sabol to make the presentation of the \$25.00 prize to Michael Flannigan of Dixon, who had previously been declared the winner of the Name the College Contest.

3. President Tabor appointed Gerald Stuff and Kenneth Beam as acting officers of the state. The selection of members in collaboration with the College staff after consulting with the advisors to determine the areas available.

President Tabor read a letter from Mr. Gustave Hinueber indicating that inasmuch as public relations for the College should now be a full time activity from Dr. Sabol's office and because of the press of other obligations, it would be necessary for him to resign as public relations director for the Board.

Mr. Walder moved and Mr. Reuter seconded the adoption of a resolution reluctantly accepting Mr. Hinueber's resignation and expressing the deep appreciation and thanks of the Board for the endless services, assistance, and enthusiasm tendered the College during the time he so artfully managed its public relations. The motion carried and the resolution was unanimously adopted.

Mr. Tabor declared the meeting adjourned to March 28, 1966, 7:30 P.M. Walnut Community High School, Walnut, Illinois.

RESOLUTION canvassing and declaring the results of a special election held on February 26, 1966, in and for Junior College District No. 600, Whiteside, Lee, Ogle, Henry and Bureau Counties, Illinois.

WHEREAS the Board of Junior College District No. 600, Whiteside, Lee, Ogle, Henry and Bureau Counties, Illinois, did on the 31st day of January, 1966 adopt a resolution calling a special election to be held in and for said Junior College District on the 26th day of February, 1966, whereat there would be submitted to the voters of the District the following proposition:

"Shall the Board of Junior College District No. 600, Counties of Whiteside, Lee, Ogle, Henry and Bureau and State of Illinois, issue bonds of said District to the amount of Three Million Nine Hundred Seventy-five Thousand Dollars (\$3,975,000.00) for the purpose of borrowing money to pay the cost of a site for Junior College purposes and to build and equip suitable buildings thereon and to provide funds for transfer to the Illinois Building Authority in accordance with the provisions contained in Article V of the Public Junior College Act of the State of Illinois?"

\$3,975,000 College Building Bonds
Amortization Study

The purpose of this memorandum is to present a brief discussion and pertinent data relative to the adoption of a method of retiring \$3,975,000 of bonds to be issued for the construction and equipping of new Community College Buildings, as approved by the voters at an election held on February 26, 1966.

Outstanding Bonds

The District has no bonds presently outstanding.

Assessed Valuation

The equalized assessed valuation of the District for the year 1965 is \$376,863,784.

General Requirements for Bond Amortization

The proposed bonds are required by law to become due within twenty years from the date of issue. On the basis of the current indications of stability apparent in the bond market, albeit at a higher level than that of previous months, and assuming your concurrence with a sale date in the latter part of April, a date of issue of May 1, 1966 is suggested.

As tax collections are completed in the fall of the year, it is customary and advisable to schedule principal maturities late in the fall, by the time tax distributions can be expected to be available. We recommend December 1 as the principal maturity date, allowing adequate time for delays in tax payment dates or tax distributions which might be encountered in some future year.

Inasmuch as the first levy for the proposed bond issue will not be collected until mid-1967, the first possible principal maturity, therefore, would be December 1, 1967, and the maximum number of annual maturities would be nineteen, from 1967 through 1985.

Interest on the bond issue would be payable semiannually, on June 1 and December 1 of each year. To allow time for the collection of taxes, the first interest payment would be December 1, 1967 covering interest from the date of the bonds to that time, or one and seven-twelfths years. Also, to assure that funds will be on hand for the June 1, 1968, interest payment, the initial tax levy, for the year 1966 to be collected in 1967, would include an amount sufficient for that purpose. The levy, therefore, would include two years' and one month's interest. Subsequent tax levies include only one year's interest, from June to June. To avoid an unduly high initial tax rate in the first year, 1966, particularly in view of your desire to maintain an 8¢ tax rate, no principal payments have been scheduled in the first year on the tables below, thus allowing only 18 annual principal payments.

Selection of Maturity Schedule

The primary considerations followed in determining these schedules for amortization of principal of the bond issue are (1) the keeping of borrowing cost at a minimum, and (2) presenting a program which will maintain a tax levy of approximately 8 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation.

The greatest interest savings is realized, of course, from the shortest borrowing period. This is a two-fold proposition: not only is interest cost reduced by paying off principal promptly, but the rate of interest on the borrowed funds is lower. On the other hand, larger annual tax levies are required to pay off the bond issue over a shorter period. Therefore, a judgment must be made, taking into consideration what is conceived to be a reasonable tax rate, acceptable to the public at large, interest savings possible through shorter amortization periods, a to what extent the utility of the project warrants spreading the cost over the taxpayers in years to come.

Tables are attached for consideration which illustrate the effects of two different amortization plans.

The following tabulates the differences in interest cost and effect on tax rates between the tables:

Notes on Tables:

1. It is assumed that the bonds will be issued as of May 1, 1966. First tax levy includes interest from May 1, 1966 to June 1, 1968.
2. Tax rates are shown in cents per \$100 of equalized assessed valuation. No consideration has been given to increased valuation in subsequent years, which will reduce tax rates proportionately. For precise comparison, required rates are shown in hundredths of one cent.
3. Interest rates used in calculations are conservatively high.

WHEREAS, the terms of Warren E. Walder and Clayton R. Schuneman, as members of the Board of Junior College District Number 600, Whiteside, Lee, Ogle, Henry, and Bureau Counties, Illinois, are about to expire, and

WHEREAS, an election will be necessary to fill the vacancies thereby created,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of said Junior College District Number 600 as follows:

Section 1

That an election be and the same is hereby called for the purpose of electing two members to the Board of Junior College District Number 600 to serve for full terms of three years each, said election to be held on Saturday, the 9th of April, 1966, and the polls at said election shall be open from 12:00 Noon to 7:00 P.M. on that day.

Section 2
