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MINUTES OF SAUK VALLEY COLLEGE BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING

July 27, 1970

The Board of Trustees of Sauk Valley College met in regular meeting at 8:00 p.m. on July 27, 1970 in the Student Activity office at Sauk Valley College, Rural Route #1, Dixon, Illinois

Call to Order:

Chairman Schuneman called the meeting to order at 8:06 p.m. and the following members answered roll call:

Absent: Gerald Stuff

Approval of Minutes:

It was moved and seconded that the minutes of the July 13, 1970 meeting be approved as presented. Motion voted and carried.

Treasurer's Report:

It was moved and seconded that the Board approve the attached Treasurer's report. Motion voted and carried.

Bills Payable:

It was moved and seconded that the Board approve the bills as listed and attached in the following amounts;

Educational Fund	\$149,753.38
Building Fund	19,629.62
Site and Construction	78,421.47

The following vote was recorded: Ayes Members Coplan, DeWeerth, Perkins, Reuter, Walder and Schuneman. Nays-0. Motion carried.

Payroll: It was moved and seconded that the June 30, 1970 payroll in the amount of \$113,951.52 and the July 15, 1970 payroll in the amount of \$43,724.02 be approved for payment. The following vote was recorded: Ayes Members Coplan, DeWeerth, Perkins, Reuter, Walder, and Schuneman. Nays-0. Motion carried.

New Staff: It was moved and seconded that the Board approve the appointment of Richard J. Holtam as Counselor at an annual salary of \$10,725; Teresa Malone as Instructor of Humanities for the academic year at a salary of \$9,000 for the academic year, and William R. Parke as Asst. Instructor in Industrial and Technical Occupations at a salary of \$8,500 for the academic year. The following vote was recorded: Ayes Members Coplan, DeWeerth, Perkins, Reuter, Walder, and Schuneman. Nays-0. Motion carried.

Discipline Policy: It was moved and seconded that the Board approve the attached discipline policy. Motion voted and carried.

Arrival of Gerald Stuff: Gerald Stuff arrived at 8:30 p.m.

Revenue for 1970-71 Budget: Discussion was held on sources of revenue for the 1970-71 budget. Four possibilities pointed out were as follows:

1. The use of the fund balances,
2. An increase in tuition.
3. Possible increase in Junior College aid,
4. Another referendum.

Referendum: After further discussion, it was moved and seconded that the Board hold a five cent referendum on September 26, 1970 for the Building Fund. In a roll call vote the following was recorded: Ayes Members DeWeerth and Schuneman. Nays Members Coplan, Perkins, Reuter, Stuff and Walder. Ayes-2 Nays - 5 **Motion defeated.**

Tuition: It was moved and seconded that the tuition for the Fall semester of 1970 remain at the present rate of \$10.00 per credit hour,

- Amendment:** It was then moved and seconded that the above motion be amended to read "and raise the tuition by \$1.00 for the spring semester and collect 50% of the comprehensive fee as of the spring semester which would be transferred to the Educational Fund." The amendment was then withdrawn and a vote held on the original motion and the following roll call was recorded: Ayes Members: Coplan, DeWeerth, Perkins, Reuter, Stuff, Walder and Schuneman. Nays-0. Motion carried.
- Tuition Raise:** It was moved and seconded that effective with the spring semester the tuition per credit hour be raised \$1.00. The following vote was recorded: Ayes Members Coplan, DeWeerth, Perkins, Reuter, Stuff, Walder and Schuneman. Nays-0. Motion carried.
- Application Fee Income:** It was moved and seconded that the revenue from application fees, presently in the Comprehensive Fee Fund, be transferred to the Educational Fund and all future revenue from application fees be deposited in the Educational Fund. The following vote was recorded: Ayes Members Coplan, DeWeerth, Perkins, Reuter, Stuff, Walder and Schuneman. Nays-0. Motion carried.
- Work Session:** A discussion was held on expenses for the 1970-71 academic year. It was the consensus of the Board that a work session be held before the next meeting at 6:30 p.m. on August 10, 1970 for the purpose of reviewing expenditures for the coming year.
- Working Cash Fund:** The Board requested that information be provided on the legislation concerning a Working Cash Fund.
- Food Service:** It was moved and seconded that the Board approve the attached specifications for bids on food service for the college. Motion voted and carried.

New Organization for
the Board of Trustees:

It was moved and seconded that the Sauk Valley College Board of Trustees approve in principle the development of a state-wide organization of junior college board members which would not be affiliated with any other junior college group. Motion voted and carried.

Retreat:

It was moved and seconded that the Board approve holding a one day Retreat for administrators and Board members sometime in late September. Motion voted and carried.

Miscellaneous:

Discussions were held on the capacity of our present sewage plant, transportation bids, and the Illinois Junior College Recognition Report.

President Sabol's Report:

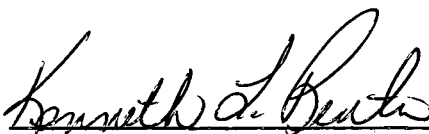
Dr. Sabol reported that the current work stoppage on construction was due to an informational picket set up by the Carpenter's local.

He also reported that applications for the fall semester continue to fall behind the figure of one year ago, but that a concentrated effort was being made to contact students in regard to fall enrollment.

Adjournment:

Since there was no further business, it was moved and seconded that the Board adjourn. The following vote was recorded: Ayes Members Coplan, DeWeerth, Perkins, Reuter, Stuff, Walder and Schuneman. Nays-0. Motion carried. The next meeting will be August 10, 1970 at 8:00 p.m. with a work session for board members scheduled for 6:30 p.m. on that date.

DISCIPLINARY PROCEDURES FOR SAUK VALLEY COLLEGE

ARTICLE I. PURPOSE AND SCOPE

The Sauk Valley College disciplinary procedures are hereby implemented and shall be executed to afford any student charged with a violation of such code to a full and fair hearing to be held in such manner to guarantee fundamental fairness and due process. This procedure excludes academic irregularities as outlined by the official college catalog.

ARTICLE II. GROUNDS FOR DISCIPLINARY ACTION

The following are grounds for the imposition of disciplinary action:

SECTION 1) Misrepresentation

- a) Knowingly furnishing false information to the College
- b) Forgery, alteration, mutilation, or unauthorized use of College documents, records, or identification.

SECTION 2) Obstruction or disruption of teaching, research, administration, disciplinary procedures, or other college approved student activities or events.

SECTION 3) Physical abuse to any person on college owned or controlled property or at any college sponsored or supervised functions.

SECTION 4) Conduct which threatens or endangers the health or safety of any person on college owned property; wrongly restrains or restricts the freedom of movement of any person on college owned or controlled property or at any college sponsored functions.

SECTION 5) Theft of or damage to property.

a) On campus - occurring to students, college employees,
or visitors.

b) Off campus - college owned property.

SECTION 6) Unauthorized entries to college facilities or use of
college owned supplies or equipment.

SECTION 7) Use, possession, or distribution of narcotic or dangerous
drugs as defined by law on college owned or controlled
property or at college approved functions.

SECTION 8) Use, possession, or distribution of alcholic beverages on
college controlled property.

SECTION 9) Violation of written college policies or posted campus
regulations.

SECTION 10) Violation of any state or federal statute such as gambling,
sanitation code, etc., on college controlled property or
at college approved functions.

ARTICLE III TYPES OF DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS

The following are the types of disciplinary action
which may be imposed:

SECTION 1) Reprimand - A verbal reprimand given in a disciplinary
conference with the Dean of Student Services. No record
is made in the student's confidential file. (See Article IV)

SECTION 2) Disciplinary letter - Following a disciplinary conference
with the Dean of Student Services, a letter is sent to the
student and a copy is filed in the individual's confidential

file. This letter shall invite the student to confer with the college regarding the problem. No reference will be made in the student's permanent record that he had received a disciplinary letter, nor shall this disciplinary letter be used as part of his transcripts or credentials.

SECTION 3) Disciplinary probation - Disciplinary probation consists of the removal of the student from all college organization offices and denial to him of the privilege of participating in all college and student sponsored activities, including public performances or any one or more of the foregoing. The term of disciplinary probation shall be not less than one school month nor longer than four school months. When a student is placed on disciplinary probation by the Dean of Student Services, the Dean shall notify the appropriate administrative personnel and all extracurricular advisors. A student on disciplinary probation is subject to suspension for any further disciplinary referrals.

SECTION 4) Temporary suspension - Temporary suspension consists of the temporary removal of the student from the college for both academic and extracurricular activity purposes during the limited time necessary to complete the investigation and prosecution of the disciplinary action of suspension. Temporary suspension shall be imposed when deemed necessary for the protection of the safety and welfare of the college

or the students thereof. Action leading to a temporary suspension may be initiated by any staff or faculty member authorized by the President of the College. The person invoking a temporary suspension must file a written complaint with the Dean of Student Services. Upon the filing with the Dean of Student Services of the written complaint, the Dean of Student Services shall promptly file a notice of disciplinary action. A preliminary hearing shall be held within two school days by the Student Review Board. Purpose of the preliminary hearings shall be to determine whether the immediate suspension shall remain in force until the conclusion of the investigation and the presentation of charges under Article VII of this policy.

SECTION 5) Disciplinary suspension - Disciplinary suspension consists of the removal of the student from his enrollment in college for both academic and extracurricular activity purposes for not less than five school days. Special provisions may be made by the Dean of Student Services in cases of pending appeals during the final examination period. The Dean of Student Services shall notify all appropriate college personnel whenever a suspension takes place.

SECTION 6) Expulsion - Expulsion consists of the permanent and unconditional removal of the student from the college. The term "Expelled by the action of the Board of Trustees" and the date shall be entered on the student's permanent

record. The procedure to be followed in the imposition of expulsion is indicated in Article VI and VII of this policy.

ARTICLE IV. DISCIPLINARY AUTHORITY

It shall be the responsibility of the Dean of Student Services to enforce college disciplinary policy, maintain adequate records, and to discipline students in the manner prescribed herein. A confidential file shall be maintained by the Dean of Student Services for the purpose of recording actions taken in regard to Article III, Sections 2, 3, 4, and 5. No reference will be made in the student's permanent record that he received disciplinary action, nor shall this disciplinary action be used as part of his transcripts or credentials. This confidential file shall be destroyed one year after the individual terminates his attendance at Sauk Valley College.

ARTICLE V. STUDENT REVIEW BOARD

The Student Review Board shall be composed of four elected students who are enrolled as full-time students and four faculty members elected from the faculty at large. The Associated Students' Board shall conduct the election of student members to the Student Review Board in the fall semester of each academic year. The Faculty Council shall conduct the election of faculty representatives to the

Student Review Board. All vacancies shall be filled by a 2/3 majority vote of all members of the Student Review Board. The Board shall designate one student member and one faculty member to act as co-chairmen. All action taken by the Student Review Board under these procedures shall be taken by a majority of the members present. A quorum shall consist of five members present. No member of the Board who was not present at all hearings during the appeal shall vote upon such appeal except with the consent of the appellant, the Dean of Student Services, and the Student Review Board. The decision of the Student Review Board and any minority opinions of the Student Review Board shall be transmitted to the student charged, to the Dean of Student Services, and the President of the College for their subsequent action. If either party or the President deems it necessary, an appeal may be submitted to the Board of Trustees for final action. An appeal shall be submitted to said Board of Trustees if a majority of the members of the Student Review Board are unable to agree upon a decision.

ARTICLE VI. INITIATION OF DISCIPLINE

When action proposing disciplinary suspension, or expulsion is initiated, the Dean of Student Services shall file with the President of the College and the Co-Chairmen of the

Student Review Board a notice of intended disciplinary action. Written notice to the student involved shall be served by certified mail, addressed to his usual place of abode. The notice shall include or contain the following:

- a) A copy of these policies.
- b) Specific factual allegations of misconduct and reference to any specific rules which the facts, as alleged, violate.
- c) The possible disciplinary action that could be awarded.
- d) If suspension is to be imposed, notification thereof, and of the reasons therefore; and
- e) An appeals form. An appeal is initiated by filing a completed and signed appeals form with the Dean of Student Services, either personally or by certified mail.

ARTICLE VII. APPEAL

The student or his parent or guardian, if the student is a minor, may appeal the proposed disciplinary action to the Student Review Board by filing a completed form with the Dean of Student Services not later than five school days after service of the notice of intended disciplinary action upon the student. If no appeal is perfected, the

matter of discipline shall be acted upon by the Dean of Student Services.

ARTICLE VIII. HEARING BY THE STUDENT REVIEW BOARD

If the student or his parent or guardian files an appeal the notice of intended disciplinary action in the manner described, the Student Review Board shall conduct a hearing upon the charges contained in the notice of disciplinary action. The hearing shall be closed to all parties except the appellant, his counsel, his parents if he is a minor, and the Dean of Student Services. The student involved or his predesignated representatives, shall be given not less than five school days advance written notice from the Student Review Board of the time, date, and place of said hearing. This will not prohibit the parties and the Student Review Board from agreeing upon an earlier time, date, and place for any hearing. The hearing will be an inquiry into the question of whether the alleged act giving rise to the recommended action did in fact occur, and if so what action shall be imposed. The student must be afforded an opportunity to inspect any affidavit or other evidence that the institution intends to submit against him. He shall also be provided with a list of witnesses and copies of any statements or complaints they have made. The appellant or the Dean of Student

Services may request the removal for legitimate cause, of any member of the Student Review Board. The replacement will be in accordance with ARTICLE V. of this policy. During the hearing, the Dean of Student Services shall present evidence in support of the charges contained in the notice of disciplinary action. The student shall have the right to present evidence, including witnesses, contesting or explaining those charges. Either the student or the Dean of Student Services may be represented by one person whom he has designated as counsel and either party or their counsel may cross-examine witnesses. The hearing may be continued from time to time, and shall be recorded with a tape recorder and by a stenographic reporter, and the costs will be assumed by the College. At the conclusion of the hearing, the Student Review Board shall render a written decision which shall contain specific findings of fact, and the type of action which it recommends. A minority report may be submitted by any member of the Student Review Board. All transcripts and recordings of the hearing shall become the property of the College. A copy may be furnished to the appellant upon receipt of his written request.

ARTICLE IX. DECISION BY THE COLLEGE PRESIDENT

The decision of the Student Review Board and any minority opinions of the Student Review Board, shall be transmitted to the Dean of Student Services and the President of the College for their subsequent action. If the College President deems it necessary, the appeal may be submitted to the Board of Trustees for final action.

ARTICLE X. ACTION BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

A full record of all Student Review Board proceedings which are referred to the Board of Trustees for decision shall be presented to the Board in advance thereof. The decision of the Board shall be based upon the record and evidence presented by the Student Review Board. The decision of the Board shall be final, and any discipline imposed shall take effect from and after the date of said decision.

ARTICLE XI. PUBLICATION OF POLICIES

Copies of these procedures, together with the designations of the elected members of the Student Review Board shall be public knowledge. The Dean of Student Services shall take further steps to make such information known to the students and faculty. A copy of this policy shall appear in the student handbook and the faculty handbook.

INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS

1) General

Enclose bid, properly executed, in the enclosed, or similar envelope, mark with title of bid, date, and time of opening. Seal and deliver to the Office of Business Services on or before the time scheduled for the opening. All bids are due no later than 9:00 a.m., August 10, 1970.

Unsigned or late bids will not be considered.

Sauk Valley College is not subject to Federal Excise Tax or Illinois Retailer's Occupational Tax. Exemption letters will be furnished if requested.

Correspondence shall be addressed to the Dean of Student Services.

Bids are to be submitted to the Office of the Dean of Business Services.

2) Errors and omissions

The special attention of bidders is directed to the policy that no claim for relief because of errors or omissions in the bidding will be considered; and bidders will be held strictly to the proposals as submitted. Should a bidder find any discrepancies in, or omissions from, any of the documents, or be in doubt as to their meanings, he shall advise the Dean of Business Services, who will issue the necessary clarifications to all prospective bidders by means of addenda.

3) Firm quote

All bids will be considered to be firm for a period of forty-five (45) days from the date established for the opening of bids.

4) Withdrawal of bids

Bids may be withdrawn by letter, telegram, or in person prior to the time and date established for the opening of bids.

5) Investigation of bidders

The Dean of Business Services will make such investigation as is necessary to determine the ability of the bidder to fulfill bid requirements. The bidder shall furnish such information as may be requested and shall be prepared to show completed installations of equipment, types of services, or supplies similar to that included in this bid. The Dean of Business Services reserves the right to reject any bid if it is determined that the bidder is not properly qualified to carry out the obligations of the Contract.

6) Reservation of rights by Sauk Valley College

The College and/or the Board of Trustees reserves the right to reject any or all bids, to waive irregularities, and to accept that bid which is considered to be in the best interests of the College. Any such decision shall be considered final.

7) Compliance with legislation

Bidder's signature shall be construed as acceptance of, and willingness to comply with, all provisions of the acts of the General Assembly of the State of Illinois relating to wages of laborers, preference to citizens of the United States and residents of the state of Illinois, discrimination, and intimidation of employees. Provisions of said acts are hereby incorporated by reference and become a part of this proposal and specification.

8) Signature constitutes acceptance

The signing of these bid forms shall be construed as acceptance of all provisions contained herein.

**PERTINENT INFORMATION ABOUT THE VENDOR
AND HIS OPERATION**

1) Company Information

- A. Name and address of operating company
- B. What is the duration and extent of your experience in the operation of vending services? Nationally? Locally? (attach answers)
- C. Submit a list of similar locations and other locations in this area which you operate vending and manual services and give length of time for each operation.
- D. References: Give names and addresses of at least three references, including three references as to financial ability to carry on the business, and three references as to technical ability to carry on the business. Reference letters from responsible persons may be submitted.
- E. Submit a complete balance sheet or annual report certified by a Certified Public Accountant as of your last fiscal year of operation.

2) Personnel

- A. State number of employees to be provided to meet the demands of the location
- B. Employees of contractor to be bonded
- C. Employees of contractor to be in uniform

3) Maintenance

- A. The vendor shall have access to the food service equipment located in the second floor dining room and the snack bar area. If additional cold storage or other food service areas are needed, the vendor shall make special arrangements for the use of these areas with the College.
- B. The vendor's staff will be responsible for proper use of the equipment. Initial instruction on the use of equipment prior to the actual operation of the food service will be conducted by the manufacturer.
- C. The College will institute a program of preventive maintenance and regular replacement of worn, damaged or malfunctioning equipment which must be carried out. Any damage which results due to the misuse of the equipment shall be the responsibility of the vendor.

4) Service and Price

A. Service location facilities

- 1) Specific street addresses from which supplier will service machines.

B. Number of employees

C. Annual dollar volume

D. Number of customer company locations in area

E. Method of service operation - in detail

F. Price

- 1) State products to be vended and corresponding selling prices. Include weights, quality, and other pertinent data.

5) Insurance

The operator agrees to submit to the College a copy of its insurance policies during the term of this agreement. The insurance policies shall include Product Liability and the following protection:

A. Public liability: \$100,000 each person; \$300,000 each occurrence

B. Property Damage: \$50,000 each occurrence

C. Workmen's Compensation Insurance required by location

D. Automobile liability: \$100,000 each person, \$300,000 each occurrence, Property Damage, \$50,000

6) Payments and Accounting

A. Internal Accounting Program

- 1) Describe in detail complete accounting procedures:

- (a) Inventory - warehouse and on location
- (b) Service personnel accounting controls
- (c) Coin-counting facilities

- 2) Method of recording - checking and reporting sales forms used (include samples)

- 3) Include all regular accounting forms used with explanation of each and their general importance.

4) Explain your internal audit system

5) Method of commission payments - explain in detail

6) Such other reasonable financial or statistical reports as may be required.

B. State financial arrangements on which you plan to operate account.

C. The vendor shall submit a copy of an annual certified audit report containing the details of the income and expenditures covering the operation at the College. This audit report shall be submitted no later than sixty days after the close of the fiscal year and also at the termination of this agreement should the contract not coincide with the fiscal year of the vendor.

PERTINENT INFORMATION ABOUT THE COLLEGE

1) Enrollment

Estimated enrollment for Sauk Valley College, fall of 1970-71 will be a head count of 1,600. Of this total, approximately 1,000 may be regarded as daytime students.

2) Location

A manual food service operation shall be maintained in the second floor dining room. A combination of vending and manual food service shall be offered at the first floor snack bar. Additional vending operations shall be located on the first floor in the recreational room.

3) Time and dates of operation

The manual food service shall be maintained during the hours of 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m., five days a week during the fall and spring semesters of 1970-71. The hours for the first floor snack bar shall be determined by the bidder. The vending machines shall be maintained throughout the building six days a week, fifty-two weeks a year except at those times when the college is completely closed down.

4) Personnel to be served

The primary service will be intended for the estimated population of 1,000 students. Sauk Valley College also maintains approximately 150 faculty and auxiliary staff which may use the food service operation.

5) Special dining room

In addition to the regular food service and vending operation in the areas specified there may on occasion be a need for catering services in the special dining room adjacent to the main dining room on the second floor. The vendor will be responsible for prearranged and predetermined catering service in that area. Daily use of the dining room will be by the faculty and staff from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

6) Cleaning of special dining room, main dining room and snack bar excluding food service area

The vendor will be responsible for cleaning tables and maintaining the area in the regular dining room and the special dining room. The vendor will be responsible for cleaning tables and maintaining the area at any time where

food service has been provided by the vendor on a catered or prearranged basis. The vendor shall also be responsible for the cleanliness of the snack bar area and the tables utilized in conjunction with the snack bar during those hours the snack bar is in operation.

7) Utility costs

Utility costs for the operation of all areas of the food service shall be absorbed by the College. The College is not to be responsible for any food spoilage resulting from utility failures beyond the powers of the College to adequately control such failures.

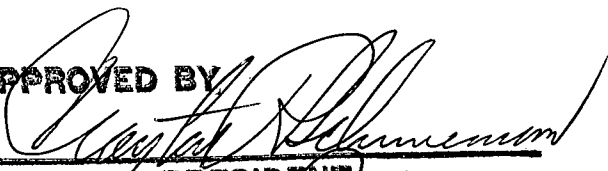
