MINUTES OF THE SAUK VALLEY COLLEGE BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING

December 22, 1980

The Board of Trustees of Sauk Valley College met in regular meeting at 7:30 p.m. on December 22, 1980 in the Board Room of Sauk Valley College, Rural Route #5, Dixon, Illinois.

Call to Order: Chairman Reigle called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. and the following members answered roll call:

Minutes: It was moved by Member Prescott and seconded by Member Koenig that the Board approve the minutes of the November 24 meeting as presented. Motion voted and carried.

Anixter
Lease:

Discussion was held on the lease of the Anixter Corporation which will expire March 31, 1981 and will not be renewed. The question was raised as to the recommendation of the administration on what should be done with this space. Dr. Garner noted that the Building Utilization Committee was working on this matter at the present time and will be making a recommendation in a month or so. It was agreed that this matter should be facilitated as soon as possible in order to get a renter if the building will not be used for educational purposes.

POLICY REVISIONS

(Second Reading)

This is the second reading for the revision of the fringe benefits policy 419.01 dealing with vacations and sick and personal leave.

RECOMMENDATION: *Board approval of the proposed policy revisions to be retroactive to July 1, 1980.*

PROPOSED REVISIONS - POLICY 419.01 F - VACATIONS

This portion of Section "F" Vacations now reads:

Classified personnel, administrative faculty, and 12-month counselors will receive paid annual vacation credit at the rate of one day per month for classified personnel and two days per month for administrative faculty and counselors, effective with the first day of the full month of employment.

The revision of that portion is proposed as follows:

Classified personnel, administrative faculty, and 12-month counselors will receive paid annual vacation at these monthly rates:

CLASSIFIED

1 day per month during the first and second years of employment.

1.083 days per month during the third and fourth years of employment.

1.166 days per month during the fifth and sixth years of employment.

1.25 days per month during the seventh and all subsequent years of employment.

ADMINISTRATIVE AND COUNSELING FACULTY

2 days per month.

These rates are effective with the first day of the first full month of employment, which becomes the official employment anniversary date for all vacation computations.

PROPOSED REVISION - POLICY 419.01 G - SICK AND PERSONAL LEAVE

Revise the title to read: G. Sick and Personal Leaves

This section would be added to the end of the current section "G":

Each member of the full-time administrative faculty and classified staff may take three personal leave days annually for personal reasons. Each day so taken will be charged against the employee's accumulated sick leave credit.

Staff members shall make reasonable effort to provide adequate notice to their supervisors when they are to be on a personal leave of absence.

REVISION OF HIRING PROCEDURE

In March of 1978, the Board placed a "freeze on the hiring of replacements for natural vacancies occurring in the clerical and maintenance areas until further notice." (Minutes of the March 13, 1978 Board meeting)

At last month's meeting, the Board expressed the desire to lift this restriction, requesting that such a recommendation be prepared.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the Board of Trustees rescind its action of March, 1978, placing a freeze on the filling of "natural vacancies" which occur in clerical and maintenance positions.

RESOLUTION ON DIXON-STERLING FOUR-LANE HIGHWAY

There is growing community interest in pressing for the completion of the proposed four-lane highway between Dixon and Sterling.

It would seem appropriate for Sauk Valley College to affirm its support of this project. There are decided advantages to do so:

1. Our hundreds of students would find the entrance and exits to our campus much safer.
2. It would further facilitate the college position as an educational service center for Dixon and Sterling/Rock Falls population centers. In addition, this highway is our sole link to all of the east, west, south, and most of the northern portions of our six county district.
3. This would clarify the right-of-way between the college property and that of the State Highway Commission allowing Sauk to erect a permanent sign and message marquee at our entrance.

RECOMMENDATION: Board approval of the attached resolution in supporting the completion of the four-lane highway between Dixon and Sterling.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the completion of the four-lane highway proposed between Dixon and Sterling would create a positive link between Sauk Valley College and the overwhelming majority of the student-residents it serves, and

WHEREAS, this highway would increase the safety of the hundreds of students and participants who visit our campus daily, and

WHEREAS, we see the completion of this four-lane highway to be a direct contribution to the general economic and community welfare;

THEREFORE, be it resolved that the Board of Trustees of Sauk Valley College give conscientious encouragement to the Illinois Department of Transportation to move post haste to complete this highway project.

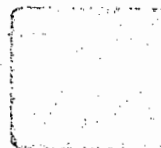

A number of school districts have expressed concern about the proposed increase in electrical rates by Commonwealth Edison.

In the past several years Illinois schools, being served by Commonwealth Edison, have absorbed more than their share of the rate increases without any effort to resist the trend by intervening with the Illinois Commerce Commission. Commonwealth Edison's rate structure discriminates against schools during the summer months when their electrical energy consumption is reduced 25% or more.

Even though school operations are drastically reduced during the summer months, such operations incur a higher per kilowatt hour cost due to the design of the rate structure which favors the industrial users. Their high energy demands during the summer months require Commonwealth Edison to provide additional generating capacity to meet industrial needs.

Commonwealth Edison acknowledges that the requested rate increase, if approved by the Illinois Commerce Commission, to schools will be between 20-22%. However, some schools will experience rate increases in excess of 25% due to the impact of the newly imposed time of day rate and revised demand charges. For example the following increases would be in effect next year:

Thornwood would increase	26.21%	(Dist. 205)
Thornridge would increase	25.95%	(Dist. 205)
Hershey would increase	25.8%	(Dist. 214)
Rolling Meadows would increase	18.7%	(Dist. 214)

In addition to the scheduled rate increase, schools will continue to be subject to the increase costs of fuel which Commonwealth Edison is authorized to pass on to all customers. During the previous school year the increase was over 8%.

This letter is, therefore, sent to you seeking the participation of your school district as a contracting party to an Intergovernmental Agreement. The purpose of that Agreement would be simply to fund the legal action necessary to intervene in Commonwealth Edison's rate case (Docket No. 80-0456) presently before the Illinois Commerce Commission. The Agreement would authorize the law firm of MEYER AND MATON to represent all of the school districts which join the Intergovernmental Agreement.

Each school board that agrees to participate will be expected to share in the cost of the proposed intervention. Inasmuch as all taxing bodies stand to benefit from this action, it is anticipated that board participation should result. Costs will be met from donations - with each district requested to donate an amount commensurate with the potential benefit to the district. It is estimated the maximum cost per district would be \$2,000., if the case requires litigation through the Illinois Supreme Court. Funds will be strictly accounted for and any excess amount will be returned on a pro-rata basis.

The attorneys would bill at the rate of \$85.00 per hour. INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT

Conserve Our School Taxes
(Project COST)

WHEREAS, pursuant to legal hearings and procedures the Illinois Commerce Commission will grant temporary, then permanent electricity rate increases to the Commonwealth Edison Co. which will affect all of its Northern Illinois patrons, and

WHEREAS, with the filing by Commonwealth Edison Co. of its proposal to increase revenues by 628 millions, or approximately 19.7%, school districts will be in jeopardy of losing certain rate concessions which can mean increases of 22% to 25% on their regular billings, and

WHEREAS, a number of school districts within the Commonwealth Service Area believe that it is important that the validity of the rate increase on school districts' properties be tested through judicial hearings, and

WHEREAS, Article VII - Section 10 of the Illinois Constitution allows units of local government and school districts to contract or otherwise associate among themselves to carry out actions mutually beneficial to the contracting parties, and

WHEREAS, the school districts which execute this Agreement find that it is in the best interest of tax-payers within their districts that this question be judicially tested and that the costs and expenses be divided equitably among the contracting parties identified as a group of school boards concerned with attaching Commonwealth Edison proposed rate increases,

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS AGREED BY ALL SCHOOL DISTRICTS WHICH ADOPT THIS CONTRACT, that:

1. This Intergovernmental Agreement shall be known as "Project COST" (Conserve Our School Taxes).

2. The purpose of the Intergovernmental Agreement shall be to judicially test the validity of the proposed rate increases by Commonwealth Edison to school districts.

3. The law firm of Meyer and Maton shall be employed at the rate of \$85.00 per hour, to carry on the work of contesting the proposed increases in electricity rates.

4. The administration of funds collected to pay for this litigation shall be carried out by a Steering Committee which shall be composed of not less than five (5) nor more than eleven (11) members. These members will be selected by the Associate Executive Director of the Illinois Association of School Boards from persons who are members of school boards which sign the Intergovernmental Agreement and volunteer for the Steering Committee.

5. The Steering Committee will review the bills submitted by the attorneys and the consultant and shall approve an equitable method, based upon an assessed valuation, of dividing those fees among the members of the Intergovernmental Agreement. The Steering Committee may call upon the members to forward a retainer fee in an amount not less than \$500.00 nor more than \$2,000.00 according to the enclosed schedule. If it should appear that the amount in the pooled retainer fund will be exhausted, the Steering Committee may request a deposit of additional funds from the member school districts.

6. Any school district which becomes a member of this Intergovernmental Agreement may, at any time, withdraw from this coordinated effort provided, however, that it shall remain liable for its proportional share of the fees and expenses of the coordinated litigation until such time as the law firm has been able to withdraw as attorneys for that school district. Upon written notice from the President of the School Board, the law firm shall promptly seek to withdraw as counsel for the school district in this litigation.

7. This contract shall be in full force and effect at such time as at least forty (40) school districts shall have agreed to participate in this Intergovernmental Agreement.

8. An executed copy of this contract shall be sent to the Associate Executive Director of the Illinois Association of School Boards, 246 East Janata Boulevard, Lombard, Illinois 60148.

9. This contract may be executed by its contracting parties in duplicate counterparts, each one of which shall constitute a binding contract document when executed by the number of school districts required by Section 7.

UTILITY COST REPORT

A report has been prepared showing the costs of utilities at Sauk Valley College over the last seven year.

Also included is an analysis of our current 1980-81 budget position, as well as a projection for utility costs for the 1981-82 budget.

This is shared as an item of information.

During the past years we have made several comparisons concerning our utility costs and the cost increases which have occurred on an annual basis.

I am enclosing herein the latest report which adds the gas and electric information for the year ended June 30, 1980. I would be happy to answer any questions concerning this data and would also include the following:

1980-81 BUDGET POSITION

The 1980-81 budget indicates that for the five-month period ended November of 1980, that the gas bill which was budgeted at 22% more than the cost of the prior year, is actually running 19% more than the cost of the prior year, with a current budget of \$120,300. The same data indicates that the budget for electricity was increased 24½% over the prior year and that we are currently operating at 25% over the prior year with a current budget of \$156,200.

It would appear that the budget for the current year might suffice though the most recent increase by Commonwealth Edison could conceivably force our utility cost to exceed the budget, with this being particularly true should we have a severely cold winter.

1981-82 BUDGET PROJECTION

Based upon publicity and appropriation recommendations submitted through the ICCB and the State Board of Higher Education it is apparent that they are recommending a continuation in the acceleration of the utility costs relative to all users thereof. The latest Commonwealth Edison increase would substantiate this fact with the last two cost increases definitely having been disproportionately higher for a large user such as Sauk Valley College. In other words, the percentage increase for SVC exceeds the percentage cost increase which has been published in the newspapers. The recommendations which I have seen

would indicate cost increases varying from 18% to 25% if we assume the approximate utility utilization of the past fiscal year. Based upon our current utility utilization a recommendation of a 22% rate increase for gas and electricity would cost Sauk Valley College an additional \$62,250, for a total gas and electric estimate of \$338,750 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1982.

Also included herewith are Schedules A and B which represents older ICCB data for Illinois community colleges which was based upon square footage and enrollment data.
