Promotions: It was moved by Member Koenig and seconded by Member Prescott that the Board promote the following faculty members as of the 1981-82 academic year:



APPROVAL OF 1981-82 MAILER BIDS

Bids have been solicited for the printing and direct mailing of five class schedules for the 1981-82 year. The five mailers include the following:

1. One for each of the regular fall and spring semester class schedules
2. One for each of the Community Service fall and spring semester class schedules, and
3. One combined mailer to include the summer session schedule and the President's Report to the community

A legal notice regarding the bid was published in the Dixon Evening Telegraph and the Sterling Daily Gazette. In addition, direct invitations with printed specifications were extended to the following:

H.C. Johnson Press, Rockford, IL

One bid was received. It was from the B.F. Shaw Printing Company for \$5,295 per mailer, for a total of \$26,475.

For the past two years, the B.F. Shaw Printing Co. has been the sole bidder for this contract. For the previous four years, B.F. Shaw and H.C. Johnson Press, Inc., bid on the contract. In each of those years, the B.F. Shaw Printing Company submitted the low bid. Their bid last year was \$4,670 per mailer or a total of \$23,350.

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR PROMOTION OF GLENN BAILEY TO PROFESSOR

1. Mastery of Subject Matter

Masters Degree in Education 1970.

Presently pursuing an Ed.D in Business Education at NIU, DeKalb.

Mr. Bailey came to Sauk Valley College with 8 years of teaching experience at the high school level. Immediately pursued a course of upgrading the entire Secretarial Science Program, which involved the re-structuring of the majority of the laboratory courses and the development of advanced courses.

2. Demonstrated Teaching Capability

Classroom and student evaluations are always excellent.

Teaches courses for SVC on-and-off campus.

Continues to manage the open-laboratory module for secretarial science program. This includes monitoring the progress for each student progressing-at-an-individual-rate. This has resulted in an increased completion rate in the secretarial science laboratory.

3. Interest in Students as Individuals

As an outstanding and effective classroom instructor, Mr. Bailey has continued to show interest in his students as individuals. This is indicated through his student evaluations. In supervising his student-majors, he arranges and chaperones field trips to businesses in northern Illinois, e.g., John Deere and Company home office, and Price Waterhouse of Chicago.

4. Understanding of the Comprehensive Community College Program

Completed several graduate level courses pertaining to the Community College, and the teaching of business education courses at that level. Through his instruction of off-campus courses for the College, this knowledge is demonstrated.

Presently (Fall 1980), he teaches a special class for Southeast Asians students with special-instructional-needs.

The following information is offered in support of the recommendation to promote Ed Beatty to the rank of Associate Professor.

1. Mastery of Subject Matter

Mr. Beatty holds a master's degree in English from the University of Wisconsin and has completed 30 additional hours of graduate work. He has published 12 poems in recognized poetry journals and presented a number of papers at professional society conferences. His post-master's degree graduate work includes courses in advanced educational psychology and curriculum development as well as upper level work in English and literature. In general, Mr. Beatty can be regarded as an excellent scholar with strong academic preparation in his subject matter field.

2. Demonstrated Teaching Ability

Since coming to Sauk Valley College in 1968, all of Mr. Beatty's evaluations have been outstanding. He has demonstrated the ability to provide excellent instruction for students of diverse ability levels in courses ranging from remedial English to creative writing. In addition, he was the first staff member to tailor courses to be offered in the nursing home program and has on several occasions taught courses in technical reporting to area industrial groups. Mr. Beatty is recognized as an outstanding community college instructor with the necessary flexibility to handle a variety of teaching assignments.

3. Interest in Students as Individuals

Mr. Beatty works well with individual students in lower level English classes, in creative writing, and in the journalism classes. He has excellent rapport with his

students and spends a great deal of time working with individual students on writing problems and assignments. For these reasons Mr. Beatty is one of the most popular, and best liked, instructors on campus.

4. Understanding of the Comprehensive Community College Program

In the 12 years that Mr. Beatty has been on the faculty at SVC he has demonstrated a thorough understanding of the role and mission of the community college. He has successfully taught remedial English, college parallel English composition, creative writing, literature, technical reporting, and journalism to a variety of students, both on and off campus. In addition, he has often been willing to take on tutorial assignments in order to fulfill the needs of students who were out of sequence or needed to fulfill graduation requirements. In the process of carrying out all of these diverse assignments Mr. Beatty has clearly demonstrated an understanding of the community college mission.

5. Potential for Continued Professional Growth

Mr. Beatty shows good promise of continuing to develop as a community college teacher and to continuing a productive record of scholarship in his field.

6. Meritorious Service

Mr. Beatty has an excellent record of responding to the needs of the college. He has been willing to take on added assignments such as the nursing home project, off campus teaching assignments under the Outreach Program and in area industries, and assume responsibility for the journalism program and the student newspaper. He has also participated in the SVC Speaker's Bureau Program since its inception and delivered a number of speeches to area clubs and organizations. Mr. Beatty has more than fulfilled his responsibilities to the college over the past 12 years.





The following information is offered in support of the recommendation to promote Robert Matter to the rank of Associate Professor.

1. Mastery of Subject Matter

Mr. Matter holds a MA degree in art and has completed 30 additional hours of graduate credit. This post master's degree credit represents a combination of graduate work and credit equivalency for exhibiting his work in professional art shows. It is also noteworthy that Mr. Matter's academic background includes professional training at the Art Institute in Chicago as well as two university degrees. He also is a practicing artist and regularly exhibits his work in art shows in Illinois and surrounding states. Thus, Mr. Matter has an excellent background in his subject area, which is reflected in his teaching.

2. Demonstrated Teaching Ability

All evaluations of this instructor have been uniformly excellent. Mr. Matter developed most of the courses offered as part of the art program and continues to assume responsibility for its quality and range of offerings. It is noteworthy that he has been willing to offer studio art courses on a concurrent basis, and by so doing has enhanced the enrollment in the art program. Mr. Matter does an excellent job of providing instruction in both studio courses and lecture courses--such as ART 114 - Art Survey. This latter course is one of the most popular courses for students to take to satisfy the humanities requirement.

learn how to paint--all in the same studio class. This requires that a great deal of time be spent working one-on-one with individual students. In addition, Mr. Matter has served as advisor to the SVC Chess Club for many years--which can be viewed as an example of his willingness to work with individual students in an out of class situation. In general, Mr. Matter is regarded as a good teacher who brings a rather formal, but friendly, approach to his teaching responsibilities.

4. Understanding of the Community College Program

Having served on the faculty at SVC since 1967, Mr. Matter has a good understanding of the community college mission. He has successfully taught all types of students in a variety of art courses since coming to the college. His willingness to teach studio courses on a concurrent basis in order to accommodate the diverse needs of our students can be regarded as evidence of Mr. Matter's understanding of the community college. In addition, Dr. McLean has published 12 plays, some of which have been staged in significant theatres such as at New York University, the University of Alberta, Pensacola, Florida, the University of Texas, American University, the Channing Murray Performance Group, the University of Wisconsin, The University of Illinois, and the Performance Community in Chicago. Thus, Dr. McLean has an excellent academic background and an impressive record of scholarship in his field.

2. Demonstrated Teaching Capability

Since coming to SVC in 1977 Dr. McLean has consistently received very positive evaluations. He does a good job of providing instruction in the basic speech classes and is a superior teacher in the theatre classes. He has also developed several new theatre and dramatic writing courses and has performed in an outstanding manner as director of the SVC Little Theatre.

1. Mastery of Subject Matter

Mr. O'Banion has completed 62 semester hours of graduate work beyond the master's degree in the areas of language, linguistics, rhetoric, literature and comparative religion. He has completed all of the course work for the Ph.D. degree in English at Northern Illinois University and will sit for his qualifying exams next summer. In addition, Mr. O'Banion has published an article in a national level professional journal on black literature and is currently working on two additional articles for publication and is writing a textbook in English composition for use at the community college level. Thus, Mr. O'Banion has a strong academic background and has a good record of scholarship in his field.

2. Demonstrated Teaching Ability

Mr. O'Banion has had excellent evaluations since coming to SVC in 1969. He has successfully taught courses in English, speech, philosophy, literature, and comparative religion to all types of students. 1. Mastery of Subject Matter

Mr. Vrhel has completed 63 hours of graduate work beyond the MA degree. His academic preparation includes a BA in social science, a MA in sociology, and extensive additional graduate work in sociology, psychology, and education. He has completed nearly all of the course work for a doctorate in educational psychology at NIU and has successfully completed the general portion of his qualifying exams. He shows good promise of completing this degree within one more year. It is noteworthy that Mr. Vrhel has been willing to complete his doctorate in educational psychology and thus qualify to teach the educational psychology course and the accompanying clinical course in education. This added training, along with his existing proficiency in sociology and general psychology, has made Mr. Vrhel a more useful faculty member since he can handle instruction in several additional academic areas. The following information is offered in support of the recommendation to promote David Youker to the rank of Professor.

1. Mastery of Subject Matter

Mr. Youker has both a BA and MA in Biology and has completed 61 post-master's degree hours in biology, chemistry, and geology. He has completed graduate work at Oklahoma State University, the University of Illinois, the University of Kansas, Southern Illinois University, the University of Northern Iowa, and Northern Illinois University and has been awarded one full year National Science Foundation study fellowship, and four summer fellowships. In addition, he has published a lab manual entitled A Beginners Guide to Collecting, Preserving, and Identifying Insects (1965) and has prepared a lab manual for the BIO 105 course at SVC which is sold in the SVC Bookstore. Mr. Youker has also been active in environmental study workshops in both Iowa and Illinois. It should be noted that Mr. Youker took additional graduate work in geology as part of a retraining effort to be able to teach GSC 115 - The Habitat of Man following the staff reduction program in 1978. Thus, Mr. Youker has a solid academic background and can be assigned to teach in several academic areas in the field of natural science.

2. Demonstrated Teaching Ability

Mr. Youker is a good teacher. His evaluations have been excellent throughout his 14 year tenure at SVC. Perhaps his greatest strength as a teacher is his outstanding lecturing ability. His lectures for the large lecture section of BIO 105 are well prepared, stimulating, and challenging to the students. Mr. Youker has an excellent mind and a good record of scholarship--which is communicated in his lectures. Also, the lab sections are very thorough and well organized. to help students master the subject matter. He maintains high standards and works hard to help the students meet the requirements of his courses. As a result, Mr. Youker has a reputation as a tough--but outstanding teacher.

3. Interest in Students as Individuals

Over the years Mr. Youker has spent a great deal of time working with individual students in order to help them get through his courses. Since he does not teach remedial or developmental courses he has had to develop a number of instructional strategies to help less able students master the subject matter. Careful attention to this situation in recent years has resulted in an increase in the percentage of students who get through his biology course with a passing grade. This has involved a great deal of time in working with students on a one-to-one basis. Clearly, this can be regarded as a measure of concern for the individual welfare of the students.

4. Understanding of the Comprehensive Community College Program

While Mr. Youker teaches primarily academic transfer students--he does understand the broad spectrum of community college students. On numerous occasions he has served in an advisory role to help work out curriculum related issues in the biology component of the Allied Health Program at SVC. He has also been willing to offer night sections of biology in order to meet the needs of adult and evening students who need a lab science course in order to complete their degree requirements. Thus, in general, Mr. Youker has demonstrated an understanding and appreciation of the mission of the community college.

5. Potential for Continued Professional Growth

Mr. Youker is a good scholar with a wide range of academic and scientific interests. He shows good promise of continuing

to attend seminars, complete additional course work, and participate in environmental workshops in order to continue to grow professionally. A well trained professional teacher, such as this, will never stop learning and growing--regardless of their position on the salary schedule.

6. Meritorious Service

It is noteworthy that Mr. Youker has participated in several important environmental workshops--especially the summer program at Northern Iowa and later at Northern Illinois University as part of the "Rock River Ecology Project" in 1972-73. Also, his leadership in helping to establish the SVC Zoological Museum this past year can be viewed as evidence of college service that goes beyond the duties normally expected of an instructor. Finally, Mr. Youker has an excellent record of college committee service over the past 14 years. He has served on nearly every committee and has been chairman of several important committees.
