MINUTES OF THE SAUK VALLEY COLLEGE BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING

March 22, 1982

The Board of Trustees of Sauk Valley College met in regular meeting at 7:30 p.m. on March 22, 1982 in Room 2K2 of Sauk Valley College, Rural Route #5, Dixon, Illinois.

Call to Order: Vice-chair Powers called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. and the following members answered roll call:

Minutes: It was moved by Member Koenig and seconded by Member Mandrgoc that the Board approve the minutes of the February 23 meeting with the notation that in the last paragraph on page #2, line 7 should read:

...his period of probation shall be extended for one more year.

Treasurer's Report: It was moved by Member Fisher and seconded by Member Koenig that the Board approve the Treasurer's Report as presented. In a roll call vote, all voted aye. Motion carried.

Energy Grant:

It was moved by Member Groharing and seconded by Member Koenig that the Board authorize the administration to move forward on the preparation of an energy grant and hire an energy consultant at a fee not to exceed \$500 to help prepare said grant. In a roll call vote, all voted aye. Motion carried.

Professional
Positions:

It was moved by Member Groharing and seconded by Member Mandrgoc that the Board authorize the administration to fill a vacancy in the Nursing area created by the resignation of Mary Krick and also to seek applicants for the Data Processing position approved by the Board last year. In a roll call vote, all voted aye. Motion carried.

Gymnastics
Equipment:

It was moved by Member Koenig and seconded by Member Fisher that the administration be authorized to seek bids for disposition of the gymnastics equipment on the attached listing, with final Board action to be taken by the Board at a future meeting. In a roll call vote, all voted aye. Motion carried.

One and Five-
Year Plan:

It was moved by Member Groharing and seconded by Member Koenig that the Board approve the One and Five Year Plan as presented. In a roll call vote, all voted aye. Motion carried.

Reports:

Student trustee, Steve Falzone, reported on the recent ASB elections, the Suzuki orchestra concert held recently at the college, the hypmotist scheduled for next week, and a guitarist who will perform at the college on April 7.

Member Groharing reported on the March 10 Northwest Region ICCTA meeting at Kishwaukee College, and the March 13 ICCTA Board of Representatives meeting in Springfield. He urged the Board to attend as many of these meetings as possible and noted that the next regional meeting will be at Highland Community College in July.

Kay Fisher reported on the March Foundation meeting which was a dinner meeting held at Red Carpet. She reported that the Foundation had approved a \$500 donation for the Humanities Showcase to be held at the college in April.

John Fassler reported that the Auditor Selection Committee had met with three area firms and will meet again on April 8 to settle on a recommendation.

Reports
(continued):

Dr. Garner talked to the Board about different revenue options available to the Board. They were:

1. Tax Rate	No chance for increase unless a Referendum is passed.
2. State Apportionment	He explained that it looked at this time that this amount would be going down and not up.
3. Tuition and Fees	Each dollar of tuition increase would increase revenue by approximately \$53,000. Selective fee options: <ul style="list-style-type: none">a. We could add a lab fee in levels of \$2, \$5 and \$10 for selected labs and generate approximately \$16,000 new dollars.b. A comp fee could be added for each student.
4. Waivers	Employee waivers could be eliminated or reduced. The present value is approximately \$15,000 a year. Senior citizen waivers could be increased from the present rate of \$1.00. The full value of the present waiver is approximately \$75,000.

The Board ended the discussion of revenue options with a question on the veterans scholarship shortfall and decided further thought and discussion is needed on waivers.

Dr. Garner also reported on the status of the Economic Development Council the special instructional program for the unemployed at Northwestern Steel and Dixon Developmental Center Support Staff Study and informed the Board that he had been appointed to the Student Loan Committee of the ISSC.

Special
Meeting:

It was the consensus of the Board that a special meeting should be called for 7:30 p.m. on April 15 to discuss the budget and any other matters to come before the Board.

Executive
Session:

At 9:35 p.m. it was moved by Member Groharing and seconded by Member Mandrgoc that the Board adjourn to executive session to discuss collective bargaining and the employment, appointment, or dismissal of an employee. In a roll call vote, all voted aye. Motion carried.

Session:


At 10:51 p.m. the Board returned to regular session.

AUTHORIZATION TO SUBMIT
ONE & FIVE YEAR PLAN

The 1983 One and Five Year Plan for Occupational Education is being presented to the Board for authorization to submit to the Illinois Community College Board and then to the Department of Adult, Vocational, and Technical Education in Springfield.

This is an annual requirement that we fulfill each year at this time.

The format of the plan is somewhat different this year--although the type of information and data is similar. Fully two-thirds of the document is made up of copies of all of the cooperative agreements that we have with neighboring colleges and SVC area health care institutions. The rest of the plan consists of a program-by-program improvement plan, program descriptions, advisory committee lists, personnel lists and financial information. There is also a section provided by the Student Services Division on counseling, testing and financial aids. Also, the Business Office assisted in preparing financial information for Section F. When the document is sent to Illinois Community College Board, two copies of our new catalog will be included along with the VE4 Forms which list all occupational courses offered by the college that are claimed for DAVTE funding and the preliminary vocational equipment list. The latter list will be revised and updated later this summer when we have our college budget prepared.

It is noteworthy that the Section B - Program Improvement portion of the plan required considerable input from individual faculty members and the assistant deans in each respective area. These plans then become their goals for program improvement for the next year.

Special credit is extended to Gene Wagner who coordinated the One and Five Year Plan effort this year.

Illinois community colleges should anticipate 4 million dollars less from the State in FY 83. This is a reduction of 90% from that requested by the Board of Higher Education, and part of a 53 million dollar reduction for all schools. If we are to receive any increase at all within this framework, we will be in competition with all others in the public school sector. The common school districts will be our biggest competitors, since they all have locally elected boards, as do we.

On other fronts we are confronted with the lobbying power of the IEA and IFT. Their large block of votes, and money, are a powerful influence in the legislature.

WHAT WE CAN DO:

1. Get to know our legislators well enough that they trust and appreciate our input and judgement on issues before them.
2. Invite them for a visit to the school to meet the board and administration, tour the school, and perhaps provide a forum for them with the students, and media. This should be a continuing, not one time, effort.
3. During an election year invite all the candidates to the school.
4. Attempt to get commitments from them on particular bills - then let the ICCTA know about it so they can follow up, and reinforce.
5. We need to continually work to improve the number of legislators that support our causes.

Proposed changes in the ICCTA By-Laws and Operations Manual were discussed and PASSED. Essentially these changes provide for:

1. New nominating procedure.
2. Automatic succession of Vice-president to President.

Governor Thompson's FY 83 Higher Education Budget was discussed. I have included a copy of the Agenda Item. The BHE has since presented their position to the ICCB as follows:

1. No new money for salary increases.
2. Only 70% funding in the utility allocation.
3. 4 million dollars less in FY 83 than in FY 82, or -2.8%.
4. Some increase may come from the proposed liquor tax.
5. There will be a big slowdown in the release of monies for capital expenditures.

Those presenting the Legislative Report urge each college to calculate the direct effect the State and Federal cutbacks will have on them, and notify our Senators and Representatives of the facts as they pertain to their school. Some colleges have mounted a letter writing campaign from students and parents. In another area, federal legislation has been proposed, (HR 5583), to establish a military NCO program similar to ROTC to provide advanced tech training for service people. This would be done at the community college level. All basic educational expenses + \$100 per month would be paid for by the military. Persons would be assigned to a nearby reserve unit while working on their degrees.

The following motions were passed:

1. Work with veteran's groups to get the legislature to fully fund the Veteran's Scholarship Program.
2. Support the Governor's Liquor Tax proposal with the assurance that an equitable and proportionate portion of the higher education budget will be restored.
3. Work closely with other local government associations, and the Taxpayer's Federation to achieve clear and fair definitions of personal property for taxation purposes.
4. The ICCTA President appoint a committee to study ways for community colleges to enhance their image at the federal level.

Several weeks ago Gov. Thompson proposed a change in the property tax law which would neutralize the effects of the multiplier. The ICCTA will probably be developing a position on this proposal in the near future. We will need to study the impact of this on our own school district so that I can respond properly at the next meeting.

The "LEGISLATIVE AUDIT COMMISSION REPORT ON UNIVERSITY FOUNDATIONS" was discussed at length. We are urged to review the purpose, structure, and activity of our own foundation in light of this report.

GOVERNOR JAMES R. THOMPSON'S FY1983 HIGHER EDUCATION BUDGET

Excluding funds for retirement, the Governor's proposed budget for higher education operation and grants is \$27.6 million or 2.8 percent less than the FY1982 General Revenue Fund appropriation for higher education, and \$94 million or 9 percent below the BHE FY1983 recommended level of funding. The Governor is recommending that retirement funding for the five state systems be restored to full payout over a period of years. For FY1983 the Governor has recommended that retirement be funded at 70 percent of gross benefit payout, a \$9.6 million increase of 21.5 percent to \$54 million for the State Universities Retirement System. This amount is approximately \$23 million less than recommended by the BHE for gross benefit payout.

During a briefing with education officials, the Governor stated that his FY1983 budget would provide for a total new spending increase of \$110 million. He also stated that he would support two new revenue measures which could improve his general fund recommendation, a liquor tax he has previously proposed and a tax on insurance premiums. If the new revenues become available the Governor stated that he would recommend that education and mental health receive top priority in the allocation of the \$150 million expected to be generated. The Governor also stated that there would be no Federal revenue losses assumed in his proposed State budget and he has no idea of the particulars of final Federal appropriation actions at this time. He is, however, of the opinion that there will be additional revenue losses to Illinois during the next fiscal year which will require further downward adjustments in the State budget.

The Board of Higher Education staff will be presenting its proposals for allocating the Governor's budget sometime during the week of March 8-12. The proposals will be presented to the ICCTA Board for discussion on March 13.

In the area of capital, the Governor proposed spending only \$126 million in new Capital Development Bond Funds. Of this \$126 million, \$90 million is set for expansion of state prison facilities, \$30 million for the state office building in Chicago, 4 million for Capitol renovation, and \$1.6 million for higher education.

The \$1.6 million for higher education includes equipment money for the SIU - Edwardsville multi-purpose facility and the U of I agricultural engineering sciences building. The number 5 and 6 priority projects on the BHE recommended list, Lewis & Clark's learning resource center and Kishwaukee's science building, were not included in the Governor's proposal.
