MINUTES OF THE SAUK VALLEY COLLEGE BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING

February 24, 1986

The Board of Trustees of Sauk Valley College met in regular meeting at 7:00 p.m. on February 24, 1986 in Room 2K2 of Sauk Valley College, Rural Route #5, Dixon, IL 61021.

Call to Order: Chair Groharing called the meeting to order and the following members answered roll call:

Minutes: It was moved by Member Andersen and seconded by Member Peterson that the Board approve the minutes of the January 27 meeting as presented. Motion voted and carried.

Treasurer's Report: It was moved by Member Andersen and seconded by Member Simpson that the Board approve the Treasurer's Report as presented. Motion voted and carried.

Arrival: Member Joe McDonald arrived at 7:08 p.m.

Disbursements: It was moved by Member Peterson and seconded by Member Andersen that the Board approve the bills in the following amounts:

In a roll call vote, Member McDonald abstained and the rest of the Board voted aye. Motion carried.

Payroll: It was moved by Member Simpson and seconded by Member Peterson that the Board approve the following payrolls:

Motion carried.

Land Rental Agreement: It was moved by Member Simpson and seconded by Member Borell that the Board authorize the administration to renew the land rental agreement with Paul Nusbaum for 11.4 acres for \$1,500 (March 1 to March 1). In a roll call vote, all voted aye. Motion carried.

Auditors: It was moved by Member Wolf and seconded by Member Peterson that the firm of Lindgren, Callihan, Van Osdol and Company be designated as the college auditors for the 1986 year. In a roll call vote, all voted aye. Motion carried.

Data Processing Consultant: It was moved by Member Simpson and seconded by Member Peterson that the administration be authorized to secure consultation, as needed, to assist in the planning for the implementation of expanded computer capacity at a cost not to exceed \$10,000. In a roll call vote, all voted aye. Motion carried. The Board requested a status report on the computers for the next meeting.

Marketing Services for Recruitment Brochures: It was moved by Member Peterson and seconded by Member Borell that the Board approve a new publication project and auxiliary advertising/marketing service from West, Morris, Davis and Muender, Inc. An estimate for the advertising service from WMDM, Inc., is \$6,100. An estimated \$12,000-\$15,000 will be needed for printing and production. In a roll call vote, all voted aye. Motion carried. It was moved by Member McDonald and seconded by Member Andersen that a special meeting be called for 12 Noon on Friday, March 14th to approve bids for the printing of these brochures. In a roll call vote, all voted aye. Motion carried.

Build Illinois Grant: At the last Board meeting, the administration was asked to make one additional recommendation to the two projects that were approved for the Build Illinois Grant. The administration, therefore, recommended a new telephone system. It was moved by Member Andersen and seconded by Member McDonald that the projects noted below be submitted for this grant:

Interim Director: It was moved by Member Peterson and seconded by Member Borell that the Board confirm the appointment of Dennis Day as interim director on an adjunct basis. In a roll call vote, all voted aye. Motion carried.

Salary: It was moved by Member Wolf and seconded by Member Peterson that the Board approve the salary of \$2,411.33 per month effective March 1, 1986 through August 31, 1986 for Dennis Day as interim director. In a roll call vote, all voted aye. Motion carried.

General Ed
Requirements:

Discussion was held on the results of a special study of SVC General Education Requirements which were presented to the Board at the last meeting for first reading. Dr. Garner reported that a footnote will be added to the descriptions for each of the Associate Degrees concerning the importance of computer course electives. The pros and cons of adding a new requirement of "Personal Health and Wellness" for the AA and AS degrees were also discussed. It was then moved by Member Peterson and seconded by Member Borell that the Board approve the revised General Ed Requirements to be made effective with the 1986-88 catalog. In a roll call vote the following was recorded: Ayes: Members Andersen, Peterson, Simpson, Wolf, Groharing and Borell. Nays: Member McDonald. Motion carried.

Donation:

It was moved by Member Simpson and seconded by Member Peterson that the Board accept the donation of a 1981 Oldsmobile Delta 88 and a GM Detroit Diesel Series 92 Engine from General Motors. These donations will be used in our Automotive Technology Program. Motion voted and carried.

Student Trustee, Borell, reported that three new senate members had been appointed, that the Valentine's Dance held on February 14th was successful, that the Senate would like to hold a Casino Night benefit, and that theatre will return to SVC with a chamber

Chair Groharing noted that the next ICCTA meeting would be on March 7th and 8th and that there would be a workshop on "Quality Learning" on March 7th.

Foundation liaison, Peterson, reported that at the last meeting the directors had elected Gary Roth as President, Greg Schott as Vice President, Marv Shearer as Treasurer, and Cookie Shawver as Secretary. She also said that the annual dinner will be held on March 18th at which time the group hoped to honor all donors and honor students.

Chair Groharing reminded the group of the Northwest Regional Trustees meeting at the college on February 26th.

Dr. Garner reported on the events held recently for Community College week; a request for a tour from the Wyanet School District; the spring auction of farm equipment to be held on March 1st; the April 5th auction of other obsolete equipment; the college calendar which will be presented for approval at the next meeting; and plans for a tour of the building for interested Board members.



AUTHORIZATION TO SECURE
DATA PROCESSING CONSULTATION

The task of implementing our new computer system is proving to be one that is exceptionally complex and demanding. In addition, there have been several developments which have heightened our need to proceed expeditiously. The need exceeds the resources we have in our current staff from both instructional and administrative personnel.

The time is ripe and urgent for us to retain the services of a specialist in this field.

It is requested that the administration be authorized to secure such consultation immediately.

The cost shall come from the contingency item in our budget and will not exceed \$10,000.

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that the administration be authorized to secure consultation, as needed, to assist in our planning for implementing our expanded data processing capacity, at a cost not to exceed \$10,000.

AUTHORIZATION TO SECURE
MARKETING SERVICES

It has been a number of years since we have updated the individual brochures describing and promoting the various instructional programs. We need a new supply of these for spring student recruitment in the high schools.

This is also the time, in the judgement of our Marketing Task Force, for SVC to launch a new initiative in student recruitment by revamping our entire "family" of program publications. To begin, we want to start with ten programs in the technology area. To do this effectively, we will need to secure auxiliary advertising and marketing services.

An investigation has been made of such services. As a result, the firm of West, Morris, Davis and Muender, Inc., of Rockford has given us an estimate for such services of \$6,100. Sauk would have additional costs of \$12,000 to \$15,000 for the production and printing.

A portion of these costs can be accommodated in the current publications budget, but not all.

Authorization is requested to proceed with this project and allocate the additional funds as may be needed from the contingency portion of our FY 86 budget.

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that the publication project be approved as requested with the necessary budget re-allocation as needed.

You and Dr. Garner have always been most helpful and the Board of Trustees have been very supportive of the program's development and growth. The successes are yours to share.



1. Mastery of Subject Matter

Mr. Burton has completed 60 hours of graduate work beyond the masters degree at the University of Chicago, holds a MS degree in business education and counseling from Western Illinois University and a BS degree in business education from that same institution. In addition, he has completed graduate work at the university of Washington and has participated in a number of seminars and workshops in a variety of areas of business over the years. Thus, Mr. Burton is well qualified to provide instruction in the business area at the community college level.

2. Demonstrated Teaching Ability

Mr. Burton has had excellent classroom evaluations since coming to SVC in 1967. He has successfully taught courses in business law, business human relations, economics, as well as other courses in the business area to all types of students. He developed many of the initial courses for the Business Department during the early years of the college and served as Chairman of the Business Division for over five years. Most recently, Mr. Burton has taught courses at the Illinois Department of Transportation Office in Dixon and through our Satellite Program in Morrison. Mr. Burton is regarded as an excellent teacher with a proven record of high performance in the classroom.

3. Interest in Students as Individuals

Mr. Burton has consistently demonstrated great empathy and understanding of students. He spends a great deal of time working with individual students--especially adult students who need this added measure of support.

Mr. Burton's classes are very popular and he is highly regarded as a teacher.

4. Understanding of the Comprehensive Community College Program

Mr. Burton has amply demonstrated his genuine understanding of the community college since joining the SVC faculty in 1967. His service as a division chairman, his record of committee service and his initiative in developing a number of special workshops (such as The Legal Rights of Women) which were very well received by the community--all suggest solid evidence of his understanding of the community college mission.

5. Potential for Continued Professional Growth

Mr. Burton shows every promise of continued professional development. His 28 years of experience in education illustrate the ability to change and grow professionally. He has a good record of revising his courses to keep the content current. Mr. Burton does an especially good job of keeping the business law courses up to date.

The following information is offered in support of the recommendation to promote Doris Cox to the rank of Associate Professor.

1. Mastery of Subject Matter

Ms. Cox holds a BS and an MS in reading from Northern Illinois University and has completed 30 additional hours of graduate work in reading, adult education, and counseling. Thus, she is well qualified to provide instruction in the Academic Skills Center. She is proficient as both a reading instructor and a remedial mathematics instructor.

2. Demonstrated Teaching Ability

Ms. Cox is an outstanding instructor. All of her evaluations since coming to SVC in 1980 have been uniformly excellent. She is highly regarded as an instructor in the Academic Skills area. She has a thorough understanding of the role of remedial-developmental education as part of the community college curriculum. She is especially good in working with students on an individualized basis in the reading and math areas.

3. Interest in Students as Individuals

Ms. Cox has a great deal of understanding and empathy for students. She gives generously of her time to work with individual students in the Academic Skills Center. Her empathy and understanding of adult students and other students in need of special encouragement and assistance is exemplary. Also, her dedication to the Academic Skills Center makes her an outstanding faculty member for that program.

4. Understanding of the Comprehensive Community College Program

Ms. Cox has a thorough understanding of the community college curriculum. Both her academic training and her extensive experience in education have served as important preparation for her current assignment as Coordinator of the Academic Skills Center. Her leadership role in incorporating the program at the Adult Learning Center in Rock Falls into the Academic Skills Program on campus several years ago was especially noteworthy. Currently she is providing leadership in revising the curriculum in the academic skills area. Ms. Cox's record of performance and achievement since coming to SVC has provided amply evidence of her understanding of the community college mission.

5. Potential for Continued Professional Growth

This faculty member can be counted on to continue to grow professionally. She plans to continue to enroll in graduate courses in reading, counseling, and adult education and will remain active in professional organizations. She has been an active member of the area reading council for many years and is well known by other reading teachers in the SVC community. Ms. Cox is a genuine self renewing person who is a real asset to our faculty.

6. Meritorious Service

Ms. Cox has given a great deal of time and effort to the college, and especially to the Academic Skills Program, over the years. She served as a community coordinator for the last three referendum efforts and has been an advocate for the college since joining the faculty as a part-time teacher in 1978. She has been an outstanding Coordinator of the Academic Skills Center and is highly regarded by the faculty, students and administration at the college.

7. Number of Years in Present Rank

This will be Ms. Cox's first promotion since joining the faculty as an assistant professor in 1980.

The following information is offered in support of the recommendation to promote Robert Matter to the rank of Professor.

1. Mastery of Subject Matter

Mr. Matter holds a M.A. degree in art and has completed 62 additional hours of graduate credit. His past master's degree credit represents a combination of graduate work in art and anthropology as well as credit equivalency for art exhibits and the publication of a textbook on physical anthropology. It is also noteworthy that Mr. Matter's academic background includes professional training at the Art Institute in Chicago as well as two university degrees. He is presently pursuing a second master's degree in anthropology from Northern Illinois University. Thus, Mr. Matter has an excellent background in his subject area, which is reflected in his teaching.

2. Demonstrated Teaching Ability

All of Mr. Matter's evaluations have been positive over the years since he joined the SVC faculty in 1967. Mr. Matter has developed and taught all of the courses offered as part of the art program and continues to assume responsibility for the quality and range of offerings in the art area. In addition, he has revised and taught several courses in the anthropology area during the past several years. Mr. Matter does an excellent job of providing instruction in both studio courses and lecture courses. He is regarded as an excellent teacher and his classes are popular among the students.

3. Interest in Students as Individuals

Mr. Matter has been willing to provide a number of individualized courses for all types of art students

in the studio art courses. In addition, he has been willing to offer studio art courses on a concurrent basis in order to meet the diverse needs of the students enrolled in art courses. This has made it possible to provide meaningful instruction for art majors, for general education students, and for adult and senior citizens wanting to learn how to paint--all in the same studio class. This requires that a great deal of time be spent in working one-on-one with individual students.

4. Understanding of the Community College Program

Having served on the faculty at SVC since 1967, Mr. Matter has a good understanding of the community college mission. He has successfully taught all types of students in a variety of art and anthropology courses since coming to SVC. It is noteworthy that Mr. Matter has been willing to pursue additional graduate work in anthropology in order to revise and teach the anthropology courses offered by the college. This training has complimented his indepth training in his major field and made him more valuable as a community college instructor.

5. Potential for Continued Professional Growth

Mr. Matter shows good promise of continuing to grow professionally. He recently co-authored a textbook in physical anthropology in addition to continuing to pursue advanced graduate work. He also continues to exhibit his professional art work in art shows and shows every indication of continuing to grow as a community college instructor.

6. Meritorious Service

Mr. Matter developed the idea for "Gallery 506" and continues to serve as the manager and curator for that facility. He also has a good record of presenting speeches to area civic groups and is a very popular "Speakers Bureau" participant. Finally, Mr. Matter has served on a number of college committees over the years and is a valued member of the Humanities Department.

The following information is offered in support of the recommendation to promote Stan Shippert to the rank of Associate Professor

1. Mastery of Subject Matter

Mr. Shippert holds an AAS degree in Radiologic Technology from SVC, a BS degree in Radiologic Technology from DePaul University, a M.S. degree in Allied Health Technology from the University of Illinois, and has completed 30 semester hours of work beyond the Masters degree. In addition, he has completed special internships at KSB Hospital and Swedish American Hospital in Rockford in Ultrasound Techniques as well as several courses in Computerized Tomography at Triton College. Additional post masters degree work has been completed at the University of Illinois. Thus, Mr. Shippert has an excellent academic background in his subject area as well as an extensive amount of hospital internship experience in the radiology field.

2. Demonstrated Teaching Ability

Mr. Shippert has had excellent evaluations since joining the faculty at SVC in 1977. 1. Recommend that a new survey level biology course (three lecture hours) be developed that would closely approximate the BIOS 103 - General Biology at NIU. This course would be on a level of difficulty that approximates that of CHE 103. It is the opinion of the Task Force that BIO 105 is too difficult and too high level for a survey course for non-science majors. It was further recommended that as soon as this course is approved that it would be included in the Biology section of the general education requirements for the AAS, AA, and AS degrees.
2. Recommend the development of a new nutrition course by the P.E. Department and that as soon as it is approved that it be included in the "Personal Health and Well Being" general education category.
3. Recommend that PSY 100 be changed to PSY 101 and that the clause about the Orientation courses being an exclusion to the 101 or above rule for AA and AS degrees be removed from the catalog.




