Outstanding Full-time Faculty – Dr. Stephen Miko, Professor, Criminal Justice

During his first year at SVCC, Steve completed program review on the Criminal Justice program and made significant updates to the program that support student success. He is very active in the SVCC Police Academy, where he teaches Stress Management, Police and Community Relations, Officer Wellness and Procedural Justice. Additionally, he has worked to update various simulation equipment including a staged crime scene room. Under his leadership, student involvement in the Criminal Justice Club has drastically increased due to his incorporation of a wide variety of speakers and field trips.

Steve assists in recruiting by regularly attending events on campus, in the local communities, and at the schools in our district. Additionally, he provides employment recruiting opportunities for students through his partnerships with police agencies throughout the state. To increase access for dual credit students, he is teaching sections dedicated just to Sterling High School students. Steve has taken on the role of Faculty Leader. He is participating in the 2023 cohort of the Chair Academy where he is working on expanding his higher education leadership skills.

Outstanding Full-time Staff – John Rumley – Custodial Supervisor

Outstanding Part-time Faculty - Sherry Dimmig, Adjunct Faculty - Adult Education

She also completed the ESL Standards Proficient Instructor course to become helpful in training ESL faculty on how to best utilize the new standards-based curriculum. Sherry has helped students by explaining to them what to expect in her class and thereby eliminating their uncertainty and anxiousness. She is a caring instructor who helps students be successful.
