

Sauk Valley Community College improves the lives of our students and enriches our communities. Sauk provides quality academic environments for professional and personal growth, and we believe opportunities for growth should be accessible to everyone with the desire to pursue them. I want to assure everyone who holds Sauk near and dear to their hearts that we are doing everything we can to build on SVCC's tradition of success.

Here are just a few examples of how Sauk's programs continue to evolve to meet the needs of the communities we serve:

- Sauk faculty and staff launched the Sauk Serves Program, providing more than 170 hours of community service.
- The Sauk Valley College Foundation raised more than \$1.2M, surpassing FY17 totals by 20% and increasing fundraising efforts overall for the last two years by 120%.
- **Multicraft Extended Internship Program** is a partnership between Sauk and area industry, expanded enrollments to help develop a highly skilled, in-demand labor force.
- **Small Business Development Center** is a partnership between the college, the cities of Dixon, Rock Falls and Sterling, Lee and Whiteside counties, and several area banks – continues to help local entrepreneurs begin or grow their small businesses.
- **Sauk AG** continues to grow under the leadership of Dr. Ryan Anderson and is expanding its partnerships and enrollments.
- **The Academy** at SVCC graduated its first class of elite high school seniors and continues to provide students access to an engaging college experience built upon academic excellence and leadership principles.
- **The Sauk Valley Community Leadership Program** is a collaboration with area chambers of commerce – graduated its second class of community leaders from throughout the Sauk Valley.

As you learn more about the last year in the pages of this *Report to the Community*, we hope you share our appreciation for the many efforts of our students, faculty, staff, and community partners who made this another amazing year. We are always looking for additional opportunities to expand and improve our partnerships. Just give us a shout, and we will respond!

Students Shine at Sauk

On May 11, 2018, families and friends gathered in the SVCC gymnasium and proudly cheered on Sauk's amazing students and the accomplishments they worked so hard to achieve. Of the 383 students who received academic awards, over 150 participated in commencement ceremonies.



SVCC contributes \$150 million annually to the economy of the region, based on a 2014 Northern Illinois University economic impact study. Our newest alumni will no doubt use their Sauk education to build on this strong legacy of success.

During commencement, two Sauk Stars shone especially bright—Student Commencement Speakers, Arabella Chamberlain '18 and Manuel Mooney '18.

On paper, Arabella and Manuel are very different. Separated in age by many years, Arabella dreams of exploring the landscapes of Mars, while Manuel's feet will stay firmly on the ground as he pursues his calling of being a nurse. While Arabella was homeschooled and is barely twenty years old, Manuel has owned his own business and can brag about his children and grandchildren.



At Sauk, their paths became more defined and easier to navigate, even if it didn't always feel that way as Arabella shared in her speech, "*If you'd asked me back in Intermediate Algebra if I'd ever make it to Calculus, I would've told you you're insane. Yet, here I am.*"

Along with her many accomplishments while at Sauk, Arabella was also the 2018 recipient of the YWCA Young Woman of Tomorrow Award.

Student Impact

The students of Sauk Valley Community College live, work, and raise families in the Sauk Valley area. This is their home. Sauk students are actively engaged in their communities through the College's many student clubs and organizations. Some of the highlighted activities from SVCC's student clubs and organizations include:



- **SVCC ABC AmeriCorps** members presented 173 stars (from retired flags) and candy bars to veterans and active military, assembled 300 Weekend Lunch Bags for Rock Falls Dillon School students kids (K-3), and organized 250 items of children's clothing for Pitter Patter Pantry in Milledgeville.
- **Sauk Science Club** assisted with a group study for Sterling High School Biology students in a study of the structure of DNA and a lab exercise on protein synthesis.



- **Sauk Student Veterans** organized and hosted the inaugural Freedom 5K run-walk in November to spotlight the sacrifices and accomplishments of Sauk Valley veterans and to raise funds for student-veterans at SVCC.
- **Sauk Student Activities and Student Government Association** worked with the local American Red Cross to organize three blood drives and a disaster relief t-shirt sale. To encourage Sauk students and community members to achieve their goals, the Association of Latin-American Students hosted Roberto Carmona's presentation: "From SVCC to Harvard."



- **Sauk Rotaract** collected books for Morrison Elementary first graders and participated in a reading day, planted trees for Arbor Day, and helped with community cleanup projects for the Rock River Development Hennepin Canal, the City of Sterling, and the Rock River banks.

Sauk Serves our Communities

In 2017-18, the Sauk Serves Volunteer Program began. Sauk Serves further demonstrates the College mission to engage in public service that benefits communities across the Sauk Valley area. SVCC employees served at more than a dozen events throughout the year, volunteering 170 hours of time to the causes that help build a true sense of community across the region.

A Year In Review




Sauk Renovations

Sauk is completing a major renovation of the sciences areas located on the third floor, west end of campus. Areas include new biology labs; upgrades to the physics, anatomy, and physiology labs; and new classrooms, collaborative spaces, and a plant room. This 8,000 square foot space is already in use and will serve to enhance academic experiences for Sauk students.

Sauk Ag Continues to Grow

Sauk Ag, under the direction of Dr. Ryan Anderson, boasted an almost 4-fold increase in enrollment. Students established two crop plots on campus that explore the impact of cover crops and nutrients. Support from Munson Seed, LaCrosse Seed, BASF, Peabody Equipment, and Zoeller Ag Services made the plots possible. In addition, Sauk Ag partnered with Dixon Public Schools to farm 76 acres. A successful soybean crop should be ready to come out of the field in October.

The program also hosted workshops for teachers and the community including Stihl Two-cycle engines, Shielded Metal Arc Welding, Gas Metal Arc Welding, and the Briggs & Stratton School.





Manufacturing Day

Manufacturing Day at SVCC brought together area manufacturers, educators, and more than 200 local students. The day highlighted the importance of manufacturing to the U.S. economy and displayed the rewarding, highly skilled jobs available in the Sauk Valley. This event is a consolidated effort of local manufacturers, WACC, IMEC, MIT, and SVCC. The day concluded with student teams constructing cars that they later raced in the Dillon Mall.

Participating local manufacturing companies included Crest Foods, BorgWarner, Raynor Garage Door Co., Rayovac/Spectrum Brands, Wahl Clipper, Astec Mobile Screens, Frantz Mfg., WalMart DC, Timken Drives, and E.D. Etnyre.

The Great American Eclipse at Sauk

The sun did a disappearing act in August, and the Sauk Valley community came out to the College to catch a glimpse of the once-in-a-lifetime event. Young and old alike were captivated as Sauk Physics Professor, Dr. Jim Chisolm, presented a discussion on solar eclipses.

Academy Students Advance

The Academy of SVCC provided elite high school seniors access to engaging college experiences built on academic excellence and leadership principles. Of the sixteen area high school students who participated in the inaugural class, eight advanced to enroll in fall 2018 courses. Students hailed from high schools across the Sauk Valley including: Ashton-Franklin Center, Dixon, Sterling, Morrison, Milledgeville, Prophetstown, Amboy, Newman, and Fulton.



Partnerships


Sauk continues to expand relationships by partnering with local organizations, businesses, and educational entities.

Small Business Development Center at Sauk Valley Community College (SBDC) sauksbdc.com

The SBDC at SVCC continued to create staffing opportunities and service expansion to the entire SVCC district. Businesses that have benefited from the SBDC's free client services included: Aireloom Music – Mt. Morris, Revive Boutique – Dixon, Imprintable Memories – Rock Falls, Moxie Solar – Dixon, Stone Bridge Running – Dixon, Always Plumbing – Dixon, Wash – Oregon, and Couch to Couch Counseling – Oregon. The SBDC also partnered with the Lee County Farm Bureau to present a Sauk Valley Ag workshop, the Sauk Valley Area Chamber of Commerce to host legislative updates for small business owners at the college, and social media workshops with Sterling Main Street.



Additionally, the SBDC provided Entrepreneurship Principles course instructors to assist those with small business aspirations and free advisement about starting their own business through the SBDC. With Sauk's Entrepreneurship and Small Business Management certificate, students take a distinct bundle of courses emphasizing skills in entrepreneurship, creativity and innovation, and the ability to analyze the role of a small business owner in today's society.





Whiteside Area Career Center (WACC)

SVCC teamed with WACC, area manufacturers, and machine shops to modernize the CNC equipment housed at WACC. Two new Haas vertical mills, two lathes, and six new CNC simulators were purchased. More updates are on the way thanks to \$333,500 generously donated by companies and private donors. SVCC and WACC also collaborated to improve dual credit opportunities for students.

Thanks to strong industry support, the Multicraft Technology Extended Internship Program is a great success—quadrupling enrollment over the last two years. Josh West, SVCC Dean of Business Career and Technical Programs, shared: “Our hope is that thanks to great partnerships with these same industries, WACC, and community supporters, Sauk will increase the amount of students interested in machining, CNC programming, and tool & die. We will match their interest with advanced training at the new Machining Technology Center, and after that, a great job in the Sauk Valley region awaits.”

Culver’s of Dixon

Culver’s of Dixon demonstrated a strong commitment to supporting local agriculture throughout the year. Along with her dedicated crew, co-owner and operator, Kayla Halfacre continued to support Sauk Ag students and programs in 2017-18. The *Thank You Farmers* campaign raised over \$6,000 in support of providing SVCC Ag equipment and scholarships for Dixon Ag students. For its service to SVCC, Culver’s was awarded the Ninth Annual Governor’s Volunteer Service Award.

Honorary Degree Awarded

The Sauk Valley Community College Board of Trustees conferred the honorary degree of Associate in Arts to Kathryn “Kit” Lillyman during the May 2018 Commencement ceremonies “in recognition of her exceptional distinction of service to her family, profession, and community.” The honorary degree is a highest form of recognition offered by the College to persons of exceptional distinction.

For thirty years, Kit was a creative and enthusiastic professor, providing innovative classes and workshops in Spanish, French, and English. In 2017, she bestowed a \$25,000 endowment to Sauk to assist transfer-seeking students pursuing majors in foreign languages. Before her passing in July of 2018, Kit was devoted to helping others, and her endowed gift will help support future generations of Sauk students.



The Chocolate Rendezvous

On February 16, 2018, the Foundation hosted *The Chocolate Rendezvous*. Participants from across our region enjoyed scrumptious desserts, mouthwatering hors d'oeuvres from Smoked on Third, gourmet shakes from Dixon Culver's, wine and bourbon pairings, hand crafted coffee, plenty of spirits, dueling pianos, and valet parking. The evening raised \$15,000 to support the students and programs of Sauk Ag.



Celebrating Outstanding Alumni

The SVCC Alumni Association selected Frank Selmi '73 as the 2018 Outstanding Alumni recipient. Frank earned an Associate of Science degree in Agriculture before transferring to the University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign where he earned his Bachelor of Science degree in Horticulture.

Frank has "lived" the family farm mission since the day he was born and regularly volunteers in the community. He taught at Whiteside Area Vocational Center for 13 years, and many refer to his business, Selmi's Greenhouse & Farm Market, as the backbone of Sauk Valley agriculture. About his time at Sauk, Frank reflected, "I look fondly upon my days at Sauk Valley Community College. This institution provided a solid foundation for me to take the next step."



Foundation by the Numbers

In 2017-18, the Foundation awarded \$288,000 in scholarships and over \$6,500 to support student clubs and projects. In addition, the Foundation purchased over \$145,000 in equipment and software to support the college and its programs. The Sauk Foundation continues to grow SVCC's resources with \$1.2M raised in FY 2018, which was 20% higher than FY 2017.



Sauk Finances


Revenues:

Complete a Student Information Form

Submit a *Student Information Form* to Admissions & Records. Forms are available at the College, and on the College website svcc.edu/soar.

Learn About SVCC Program/ Class Information

SVCC offers many types of programs to assist students in reaching their goals. This includes career and transfer programs, and individual class enrollment.

Satisfy Class Placement Requirements

Placement testing in English/language arts and mathematics is required of all students wishing to register for any English/language arts class, mathematics class, or any other college class requiring a specific ENG/ELA/MAT co-requisite or pre-requisite. College staff will recommend needed placement tests and assist with arranging a testing time.

Placement Options:

- ACT/SAT scores
- SVCC placement test results
- Review of credit earned at the College level

Submit Other Academic Records

Students should submit their official high school transcripts, GED scores, and college/university transcripts from institutions previously attended. Students submitting college transcripts should also file a *Transcript Evaluation Request Form* in Admissions & Records. Transcripts must be delivered in a sealed envelope.

Learn About Tuition Costs & Payment Options

SVCC tuition is charged per credit hour based on residence. Fees are in addition to tuition for classes that have additional equipment or supply needs.

Students are encouraged to apply for financial assistance, scholarships, and/or veterans benefits as early as possible. Contact Financial Assistance at 815.835.6339 for more information.

Students will need to meet with an academic advisor to discuss their career plans, placement test results, and course/program requirements. Call Academic Advising at 815.835.6354 for more information.
